The parable of the prodigal son is so familiar to us, and when stories are familiar they can lose their meaning. But let us look a little closer at the context of the story. Jesus told this parable in response to some comments and complaints by the Pharisees and the scribes: 'This man welcomes sinners and eats with them.' What would these detractors have made of the story, flying as it did in the face of their traditional morality?

What about the so-called sinners? The 'tax collectors and sinners' were already at ease in the company of Jesus; they were seeking him out to hear what he had to say, and he in turn was welcoming them. How this parable must have spoken to them! It wouldn't have been much of a stretch for them to compare the generous welcome and forgiveness of the father in the story to the treatment they were already receiving from Jesus.

REFLECTION

Loved in our sins

The prodigal son came home empty-handed. He had no trophies to show his father, no achievements with which to earn his praise, his welcome and his love. He was a failure. Worse – he was a sinner. He deserved to be punished – and he knew it. Yet punishment was the last thing he needed. To punish him would be like pouring water on a dying fire. What happened? When the father saw his lost son coming towards him, his heart went out to him, and the next minute they were in each other's arms. It is an extraordinary experience to be loved in one's sinfulness. Such love is like a breeze to a dying fire, or rain falling on parched ground. Those who have experienced this kind of love, know something about the heart of Jesus.

First Reading: Joshua 5: 9-12

Joshua 'rolls away' the reproach of Egypt from his suffering people. The 'Passover' of the threat of annihilation is celebrated. The bread of life; the manna in the desert gives way to the possibility of a new dispensation; a new form of bread for the journey and a new Passover.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 5: 17-21

Saint Paul indulges in one or more of his favourite themes and sayings. We who believe are 'in Christ' and have been recreated. We are already a 'new creation'. Our work is that of ambassadors. We are to be reconcilers because we have been reconciled.

Gospel Reading: Luke 15: 1-3, 11-32

Home is where we behave worst and are treated the best. The story of the Prodigal Son is Jesus' response to the self-righteous, to the snobbery of the Scribes and Pharisees. In order to justify his dealings with sinners Jesus tells the story of the Prodigal Son. The story has as much to do with the Father and the generous forgiveness of the Father or with the indignant, sulking elder brother and his sense of injustice. The son is merely the prop to show up the opposing attitudes to forgiveness and repentance in the story. Forget the prodigal for a moment and see the others.
