The miraculous catch of fish convinces Peter of the holiness of Jesus. This evokes in him a sense of their own sinfulness and unworthiness, so much so that he asks Jesus to depart from him. Peter has not yet grasped the fact that it was to call sinners that Jesus came, to call them away from sin to a new way of life. Nevertheless, at the word of Jesus, Peter and his companions leave everything and follow him. The phrase 'they left everything' shows the importance for Luke of detachment from possessions.

#### **CAFOD Lent Fast Day**

This year, CAFOD's Lent Fast Day once again reminds us of the need for potable water throughout the world. We all hopefully appreciate the immediate benefits of a readily accessible source of drinking water. But for some, the presence of such water in their community has a hidden impact, in that women and children are released from the daily chore of fetching water in. So women and children, especially young girls, are free to pursue more fulfilling activities. A recent press release from the charity Why Water suggests that in Africa alone Women spent 40 billion hours a year walking for water. The figure may not be CAFOD's but the message is the same. Clean water improves lives: reduces disease: allows children to have a childhood and survive that childhood and have an education: allows women a more rewarding time with their family, and yes set up that market garden – not for them the delights of day–time TV. "Treat the earth well. It is not inherited from your parents, it is borrowed from your children."

#### REFLECTION

Jesus is preaching at Lake Gennesaret (the Sea of Galilee) in today's Gospel. This is Luke's account of the calling of the First Disciples which takes place in the context of a miraculous catch of fish. Jesus is using Simon's boat as a sort of platform from which to address the crowds who had gathered around him. Already Jesus is gaining popularity and the crowds are 'pressing' near to him. Clearly they see something in Jesus that is attractive and fulfilling. Simon is probably being polite when he agrees to try again for a catch, possibly thinking that Jesus should leave the fishing to the professionals. Simon obeys, takes the risk, lets go of his pride, and the result is an overwhelming catch of fish. It can be hard to trust others at times; it can be difficult to let go of what is familiar to us. We are constantly being challenged to do this. The big challenge is to trust that God knows what God is doing and is constantly urging us to pull away from the shore.

### First Reading: Isaiah 6: 1-8

Today we see into the call of the First Isaiah. We notice Isaiah has a dramatic vision of God in the Temple. He recognises both this special moment 'my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!' and yet feels unworthy of the experience acknowledging his 'unclean lips'. God responds to reassure Isaiah, through the Seraph, purifying Isaiah with fire and words of forgiveness, Hearing the call 'Whom shall I send...?' Isaiah is able to respond to the call.

### Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15: 1-11

St Paul shares with us what many scholars believe to be an extremely early creed of the Christian faith; expressing fundamental aspects of our faith and what we believe in. Namely that 'Christ died for our sins', 'Christ was buried' and 'was raised to life on the third day'. Listening, believing and following this message gifts us with salvation. Paul acknowledges that it is only through God's grace that he has been able to share this Good News.

## Gospel Reading: Luke 5:1-11

In the Gospel today we learn of the call of the first disciples. We notice the attractiveness of Jesus; crowds of people are pressing in on him to listen to the Word of God. To our surprise, Jesus invites an uninvolved observer, Simon, who is cleaning his nets 'to put out a little from the shore'. After a while, Jesus further asks him to put out into deep water for a catch. This is a challenge as Simon's experience as a fisherman leaves him sceptical; it's a challenge to trust. Simon responds out of respect for Jesus. To his amazement there is a wondrous catch, this feeling moves to fright, conscious of his weakness in the presence of divine power. Jesus reassures him and the fishermen follow him.
