REFLECTION Gratitude

Once there was a young man who had never thought of donating blood. But then his father got very ill and was hospitalised. One day the son was sitting by his father's bedside as he was getting a blood transfusion. As he watched the blood flowing into his father's veins, he suddenly realised that someone had donated the blood that was now keeping his father alive. Straightaway he made up his mind to become a donor, and he was as good as his word. Many are willing to avail of the generosity of others, but few are willing to give something back. That is why gratitude is so important. It makes us want to give something back.

First Reading: 2 Kings 5: 14-17

Naaman, a Syrian army general, is advised by an Israelite servant girl in his household to seek healing from the prophet Elisha. When Naaman and his entourage eventually arrive at Elisha's house, he is affronted that the prophet does not deal with him directly and, instead, advises him through a messenger. Once he submits to that advice, however, he is healed. His request for 'earth' to carry home with him, from Israel, indicates the commonly held perception that a god could only be worshipped within his own domain.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 2: 8-13

The necessity of endurance, in all seasons, is emphasised here. Christ suffered and died. Paul has, in turn, suffered and experienced real hardship on account of his service. The leaders of the Christian community cannot expect to share the inheritance of the risen Jesus, if they baulk in the face of their own suffering. A saying or hymn, presumably familiar to early believers, is quoted approvingly. It spells out the consequences both of remaining faithful to Christ and, alternatively, of putting oneself first.

Gospel Reading: Luke 17: 11-19

The theme of leprosy re-appears in the gospel passage, paralleling Naaman's story. Here again, as with Naaman, the act of healing is not immediately obvious. It was in carrying out Elisha's instructions to bathe that he encountered healing. Similarly, it is in obeying Jesus' command to 'Go and show yourselves to the priests' that cleansing is experienced in the lives of the ten men. Just as Naaman went on to praise God, in the light of his healing, so the Samaritan leper, who becomes the focus of this gospel episode, praises God 'at the top of his voice'. Both are keen to express gratitude: Naaman, in his concern to offer a gift to the prophet, the Samaritan, in his readiness to fall at the feet of Jesus. Both are foreigners who, ultimately, confess their faith in the God of Israel.
