ANGELS OF PROTECTION A REFLECTION OF PSALM 91:1-2, 10-15

Here is a classical prayer of trust in God for protection all through the journey of life.

For you has he commanded his angels, to keep you all in your ways. (91:11)

The psalm is used in today's liturgy as a response to the readings from Deuteronomy, which is the closest we get to a Creed in the Old Testament. It is a declaration of belief that God had chosen, rescued and protected this people on all their ways.

The devil quoted the lines about the angels of protection in tempting Jesus. His answer made the distinction between trusting God and testing God, which is the reaction of one who doubts rather than trusts.

This psalm has been chosen as the ideal night prayer in the breviary. The darkness of night holds no fear for those *who dwell in the shelter of the Most High and abide in the shade of the Almighty.* Such is the depth of trust expressed that the text of this psalm has often been used by people as a sacred talisman to protect them from harm. The novelist, Boris Pasternack, describes Doctor Zhivago finding portions of the psalm sewn into the garments of the soldiers he was treating.

Who are the angels sent to guard us? We may think of our personal Guardian Angels, or apply the idea to God's messengers who come in the form of caring people who help us over our bumpy roads or in our dark nights.

My refuge, my strength, my God in whom I trust.

REFLECTION – TUESDAY 12TH MARCH 2019

When we are at our most desperate, our prayer may be like an attempt to open God's heart to give us what we pray for. The prayer Jesus recommends reverses that direction. He invites us to pray that we may open our hearts to what God wants. We believe God loves us and wants the best for us. As St. Augustine said in one of his letters on prayer "God's gifts are very great, but we are very small and straitened in our capacity to receive." And so we ask God to open our hearts that we may be able to receive what he wants to give us.

REFLECTION – WEDNESDAY 13TH MARCH 2019

The story of Jonah is like many a fairy tale; everything is exaggerated to dramatise the message. We are told the city took three days to cross. No city was that size in those days. in response to Jonah's preaching, even the cattle and other beasts fasted – unlike the unrepentant Israelites who ignored Jonah's call to repent. Yet God does not ant dramatic penances or fasting, but a 'humble contrite heart', people who know their need for healing and come to God in confidence knowing that god is all tenderness and compassion.

REFLECTION – THURSDAY 14TH MARCH 2019

In the culture of the Middle East, hospitality is a priority. It would be unthinkable not to help a stranger seeking help. How much more would it be unthinkable to ignore the plea of a family member? When we think of the faithful love of God for us, it is not possible that God will ignore our prayer. What are the images that you find helpful and that encourage you to persist in prayer? Jesus also invites us to be reliable friends to those who turn to us for help.

LENT AND EASTER 2019 AT ST AGATHA'S

1st Sunday of Lent Gospel Reading Luke 4:1-13

In the desert, Jesus is tempted by the devil.

Reflection

In each of the three Synoptic Gospels, after his baptism, Jesus is reported to have spent forty days in the desert, fasting and praying. In Luke and in Matthew, the devil presents three temptations to Jesus. The devil tempts Jesus to use his power to appease his hunger, he offers Jesus all the kingdoms of the world if Jesus will worship him, and he tempts Jesus to put God's promise of protection to the test. In each case, Jesus resists, citing words from Scripture to rebuke the devil's temptation.

Each temptation that Jesus faces offers insight into the spirituality we hope to develop as we keep the forty days of the Season of Lent. We can trust God to provide for our material needs. We worship God because God alone has dominion over us and our world. We can trust God to be faithful to his promises. Jesus' rejection of the devil's temptations shows that he will not put God to the test. Grounding himself on the Word and authority of Scripture, Jesus rebukes the devil by his confidence in God's protection and faithfulness.

This Gospel highlights for us one of the central themes of the Season of Lent. We are dependent upon God for all that we have and all that we are. Anything that leads us to reject this dependency or to distrust its sufficiency is a temptation from the devil.

Luke ends his report of Jesus' temptation in the desert by noting that the devil departs for a time. The implication is that the devil will return. Jesus knows that he will be tempted again in the Garden of Gethsemane. The depth of Jesus' trust in God is shown most fully when Jesus rejects the temptation to turn away from the task God has given to him. Jesus' final rebuke of the devil is his sacrifice on the Cross.

Jesus' responses to the temptations of the devil teach us how we can respond to temptation. As we start our journey through Lent, this Sunday's Gospel calls us to adopt the same confidence that Jesus had in the face of temptation: God's word alone will suffice, God's promise of protection can be trusted, and God alone is God.

Stations of the Cross will be held at 7.30pm on Wednesdays, Friday mornings after Mass and at 5.30pm on Sundays during Lent. This devotion provides an opportunity for us to walk the road to Calvary with Our Blessed Lord.

Lenten Reconciliation

A Lenten Reconciliation service will be held on Tuesday 16th April at 7.30pm here in the Parish of St Agatha for everyone. It is an opportunity for those who would like to go to confession before the Easter Triduum, which begins on Maundy Thursday. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is one of the healing sacraments and a powerful help on our Journey of Faith.

The times and details of all Masses and services are listed in the Lent and Holy Week 2019 Programme that is available at the back of the church. Please note that, on Maundy Thursday, the Mass of the Lord's Supper is at 7.30pm, the Solemn Liturgy on Good Friday is at 3.00pm and the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday is at 7.30pm. There are no morning masses these days, though there are children's celebrations at 12pm on both Thursday and Friday.

Church Flowers during Lent

One of the ways we have decided to observe Lent is by not having flowers in the church during this season of austerity and simple reflection. We hope this absence of flowers during Lent will amplify the resurrection message of the Easter flowers when they arrive!

Friday Penance

'The Bishops [of England and Wales] wish to remind us that every Friday is set aside as a special day of penitence, as it is the day of the suffering and death of the Lord. They believe that is it important that all the faithful again be united in a common, identifiable act of Friday penance because they recognise that the virtue of penitence is best acquired as part of a common resolve and common witness. The law of the Church requires Catholics on Fridays to abstain from meat, or some other form of food, or to observe some other form of penance laid down by the Bishops' Conference (Canon1251). The Bishops decided to re-establish the practice that this penance should be fulfilled simply by abstaining from meat and by uniting this to prayer. Those who cannot or choose not to eat meat as part of their normal diet should abstain from some other food of which they regularly partake'.

The form of penance we chose to adopt each Friday is a matter of personal choice and does not have to take the same form every Friday. Failure to undertake this penance on a particular Friday would not constitute a sin.

'What can I do for Lent?'

'Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving' is the Lenten tradition. We are required to fast by reducing food intake on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, but giving up something (e.g. chocolate or alcohol) is also fasting. Extra prayer during Lent is very important. Other suggestions also include: *say some additional prayers each day *visit the Blessed Sacrament

*go to weekday Mass if you can

*buy a booklet to guide your reflections.

*make the special effort involved in family prayer.

 $\ensuremath{^* \text{choose}}$ one of the Gospels and read it during Lent.

*study the Sunday readings before coming to Mass

*read Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation 'GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE' *come to the Stations of the Cross

*receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation

*Make a special effort to help someone who is poor, sick, old or lonely.

*Giving to those less fortunate than yourself.
