Sunday 15th September 2019

Gospel Reading

Luke 15:1-32

Jesus responds to those who criticise him for keeping company with the unworthy.

Reflection

In chapter 15 of Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells three parables about losing, finding, and rejoicing. The outcasts of society, the taxpayers, and the sinners approach Jesus eager to hear what he has to say. In Luke's Gospel, hearing is a sign of conversion. The Pharisees and scribes, still suspicious of Jesus, complain about him associating with sinners. So, he tells them these three parables.

In the first story, the parable of The Lost Sheep, the shepherd leaves behind the 99 sheep to search for the 1 lost sheep. When he finds it, the shepherd rejoices not alone as in Matthew's version, but with friends and neighbours. In the same way, God rejoices more over 1 sinner who repents—like the outcasts who have come to hear Jesus—than over the 99 righteous like the Pharisees and scribes.

The second story, about a poor woman who will not stop searching until she finds her lost coin, makes the same point. Why are the Pharisees complaining? They should rejoice when the lost are found.

Finally, we come to what is probably the most memorable parable in the Gospels, the story we know as The Prodigal Son. Just as in The Lost Sheep and The Lost Coin, this story (found only in Luke) is really about the seeker. The loving father is at the centre of this parable. Even though his son runs off with his father's inheritance and squanders the money, the father waits for him, hoping for his return. Upon his son's return, the father, "full of compassion," runs out to embrace and forgive him before the son can utter one word of repentance. At this point the rejoicing begins.

The parable does not end there. Rather, it makes one more point about the older son's reaction. This son who never left, just like the Pharisees and scribes who feel they are righteous, refuses to enter his father's house to join in the rejoicing. He has served his father. He has obeyed him. Perhaps it was not out of love. The father's response teaches us that God's care and compassion extend to the righteous and sinner alike. When we are lost, God doesn't wait for our return. He actively seeks us out. And when the lost are found, how could we not celebrate and rejoice?

Gospel Reading

Family Reflection

Read or retell in your own words, the three stories from the Gospel. Ask your children to recall games they play that involve losing or hiding something and then finding it. (Hide and Go Seek, Ghost in the Graveyard, Button, Button, Who's Got the Button?) Talk about how exciting it is to find the person or thing being looked for.

Ask your children if they have any memories of losing something special or being lost themselves. Share the stories as well as the fears or feelings. Then tell them that just as you would go to any length to find and bring them home if they were lost, so too would God. That is what Jesus is telling us in the three stories. No matter what we do, no matter how wrong we are, God, our loving father, is always anxious to forgive us and welcome us back home.

TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME, CYCLE C SUNDAY 15TH SEPTEMBER 2019 REMEMBERING MERCY

A REFLECTION OF PSALM 50:3-4, 12-13, 17-19.

This is a rare Sunday when the three readings share a common theme. God's mercy was shown to Moses, to Paul and to the sinners who were drawn to the company of Jesus. The *Miserere* psalm is one of the most heartfelt prayers ever composed, expressing at once the sinner's humble sorrow and the praise of God's mercy.

Have mercy on me, God, in your kindness.

We can hear its sentiment giving direction to the steps of the Prodigal Son. He decides to leave the land of famine when he remembers his fathers house where mercy, kindness and compassion were valued. This uplifting memory gives renewed hope to his crushed spirit. He needs a total cleansing so he prayed for a pure heart and a steadfast spirit. He will humbly confess his sin against God and family. All he can offer his father is a humbled, contrite heart. His wasted body pleads:

Do not cast me away from your presence, nor deprive me of your holy spirit.

Far from casting sinners away from his presence, Jesus was a scandal in the way he welcomed sinners, and even shared food with them. Paul, in the second reading, gives his personal experience: 'Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. I myself am the greatest of them.' On the cross he took sin on himself that we might be justified before God.

This age-old psalm continues to provide the language of prayer to the crushed heart. And it goes beyond sorrow to the praise of God.

O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth shall declare your praise.
