## A COMMUNITY OF LOVE A REFLECTION OF PSALM 144:8-13.

The three readings in today's liturgy have one theme in common: suffering is temporal and the glory is eternal. Paul and Barnabas put new heart into the disciples with the message that we have to experience many hardships before we enter the Kingdom of God. Then the writer of the Apocalypse, after all the persecutions and tribulations of earlier chapters, describes his vision of the new Jerusalem, where God lives among people. In the extract from John's gospel, immediately after Judas had gone out, as the passion was about to commence, Jesus spoke of his glorification. He speaks of going away but he leaves a new commandment: 'Love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another.' In John's theology, the new life of heaven begins in a community of love on earth. As Cardinal Newman put it: 'Grace in this life is glory in exile and glory is grace at home.'

'Love... as I have loved you.' In the responsorial psalm we can find some of the qualities of Christian love.

The Lord is kind and full of compassion. The grace of the Lord's presence in the apostolic community was manifest in their pooling of resources and care for the poor.

Slow to anger and abounding in love. Christian love, after the manner of Christ, does not return evil for evil, but remains a positive river of energy that cleanses all pollutants. Christian love will outlast any persecution and outlive all suffering.

Yours is an everlasting kingdom; your rule lasts from age to age.

## **May Devotions**

It is a centuries-old custom of Catholics to dedicate the month of May to the Blessed Virgin Mary. The month of May is always part of the Easter season, the fifty days we celebrate in the liturgy the Resurrection of Our Lord, a time also of awaiting the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The celebration of May as a Marian month fits well with the liturgical celebrations of Easter and Pentecost as we recall Mary's great joy in her Son's victory over death as well as her presence with the apostles in the upper room prayerfully awaiting the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. During May it has long been the tradition of the Catholic Church to highlight our devotion to Mary and seek her intercession in our lives. Each Sunday in May, from 5.30pm, we will have Rosary followed by Adoration and when possible, Benediction. Prayer life is essential in these changing times.

## 4th Sunday of Easter

Gospel Reading John 13:31-33a,34-35

Jesus gives his disciples a new commandment: love one another.

#### Reflection

Today's Gospel again comes from the Gospel of John. Like last week, today we hear words spoken by Jesus before his death and Resurrection. Jesus is teaching at the Last Supper.

John's Gospel does not include an institution of the Eucharist narrative; instead, Jesus washes his disciples' feet. Immediately after, Jesus predicts his betrayal by Judas. Today's Gospel follows that prediction. It can be read as a continuing explanation of Jesus' act of washing his disciples' feet. It begins with the announcement that this is the moment when the Son of Man will be glorified. This theme continues throughout John's Passion. Jesus will be glorified in his death on the cross and in his Resurrection, and the disciples will glorify Jesus in the love they show.

John's Gospel does not present a sentimental view of love. This is a type of love that is shown in service and sacrifice. It is difficult to choose to love when faced with hatred and anger. Jesus tells the disciples that all will know that they are his disciples because of the love they show for one another. This description of the early Christian community will be repeated in the Acts of the Apostles: "See how they love one another." Christian love is the hallmark of Christianity. We see it lived in the witness of the martyrs. We see it in the example of the lives of the saints. We see it in the holy women and men who live and love daily, making small and large sacrifices for others.

## **Family Reflection**

Is love the first word your family members use to describe their interactions? Love is difficult. Jesus' sacrifice for us is an example of this. Yet because of love, the glory of God is fully revealed in Jesus. God's glory is revealed in us when we act as the Body of Christ, as individuals and as a community. In the love we have for one another—difficult, challenging, sacrificial love—we find Jesus.

Choose one or two occasions when your family was together during the week. Describe the family's interactions from an outsider's perspective. When is it less difficult to show love to family members? When is it more difficult? When love is difficult, what do we do?

Jesus didn't just tell us to love one another. He showed us how to love one another. In what ways did Jesus show us how to love? (in his acts of healing and forgiving; at the Last Supper as he washed his disciples' feet; in the gift of the Eucharist; through his death on the Cross)
