Holy Thursday reminds us of the togetherness we enjoy in life. The Eucharist that Christ shared with the disciples represents the friendship and company he shared with them and the communion that he wished to share with them and with all of us into the future. The ordinary times when we are with friends and family are often the happiest and most contented days of our lives.

Good Friday represents all that is dark and evil in life. We remember the abandonment of Christ by his friends and disciples; the formal act of betrayal by Judas; the unjust condemnation; the mental anguish of Gethsemane; the horror and brutality of crucifixion Roman–style; the feeling of abandonment even by God the Father and the reality of death outside the walls of the city.

Saturday represents for us the emptiness of life on occasions; the feeling of futility; the bitter aftertaste of apparent failure; the many bereavements that mar most lives; the waiting that consumes our valuable time in the world. It represents the in–between times of our lives.

First Reading: Isaiah 50: 4-7

O for the gift of a well-trained tongue! The gift of sustaining the weary with a well-chosen word would be the pastor's dream. The struggle, like that of Isaiah, is not to be confounded but to continue with an open ear, with flint-like resolve to be servant-leaders, akin to the suffering servant who leads us from shame to grace.

Second Reading: Philippians 2: 6-11

St Paul turns poet in this reading. It is thought he was reciting an already well-versed prayer. Emptying the self; obedience to God's ways, will and word; humility and a spirit of service; these are the hallmarks of him whose name we bear as Christian people.

Gospel Reading: Luke 22: 14 - 23:56

Palm Sunday opens out into a week that is the highpoint of the Church year and a template for the life of every Christian. The events of Holy Week are the events of any of our lives – in miniature. The past is present; re–presented in the stories of this Holy Week.

The annual Churches Together in Kingston Good Friday Walk of Witness will start at **11am** from the United Reform Church in Eden Street. Coffee and hot cross buns will be served in the church hall from **10am**. This is a great opportunity to witness to our faith to the people of Kingston.
