Sunday 22nd September 2019

Gospel Reading

Luke 16:1-13 (shorter form, Luke 16:10-13)

Jesus tells a parable about a dishonest steward who is commended for his prudence; one cannot serve both God and money.

Reflection

Today's Gospel sounds puzzling to contemporary readers, but it can be made less so by considering the economic system which stands behind the parable. A steward is dismissed because he is squandering his master's property. He is called dishonest because he is not serving the interests of the rich man, his employer. In response the steward, in an attempt to ensure favour for himself among the rich man's debtors, brokers repayment of the rich man's loans by foregoing the interest and fees that had been levied to line the steward's pockets. It is this action, in which the steward puts aside his greed and takes the longer perspective in order to enhance his security, which is commended by the rich man.

The passage concludes with three morals for the listeners. The first exhorts the listener to be prudent about the use of wealth. Like the steward in the parable, those who would follow Jesus must put transitory affairs in proper perspective. Christians should handle the affairs of temporal life with an eye toward eternal life.

The second concerns trustworthiness. Those who can be trusted in small things can also be trusted in great things. If Christians handle money and other passing things responsibly, then they can also be trusted with the affairs of the Kingdom of God.

Finally, Jesus tells his listeners that no one can serve two masters simultaneously. God must be put ahead of money.

Family Reflection

Talk with your children about some things that they have done to show that they can be trusted. Talk a bit about what it means to be responsible. Responsibility often means that we put aside something of passing value for something of greater value.

Read together the short form of today's Gospel, Luke 16:10-13. Talk about the importance of responsible use of money and our material possessions. As a family, commit to one action that you will take this week to show that your family serves God and not money.

October Devotion: The Holy Rosary

Since the 16th century Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. Pope Leo XIII personally started the practice of devoting October to the Rosary devotion. In a letter of September 1, 1883, mindful of the Rosary's power to strengthen faith and foster a life of virtue, he outlined the triumphs of the Rosary in past times and admonished the faithful to dedicate the month of October to the Blessed Virgin through the daily recitation of the Rosary, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, in order to obtain through her intercession, the grace that God would console and defend His Church in her sufferings. During October, we invite everyone to pray your rosary. We especially encourage families to pray the rosary together. As a parish we shall dedicate Sunday Evenings to Pray the Rosary together and finish with Benediction. Never mind if you're a bit rusty, or if it's been a while since you last prayed your rosary. It's never too late to begin again, and everyone deserves to experience the power of the rosary. We will start at 5.30pm every Sunday: 1st, 8th, 15th, 22nd, 29th. We are all encouraged to make this a date with Mary.

TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME, CYCLE C SUNDAY 22ND SEPTEMBER 2019 BLESSED ARE THE POOR A REFLECTION OF PSALM 112:1-2, 4-8.

Today's readings carry a sever warning to the rich but the psalm gives hope to the poor. Amos lists a variety of ways in which injustices are done to the poor but he warns that nothing escapes the eye of God. 'never will I forget a single thing you have done.'

Care for the poor and downtrodden is one of the great themes of Luke's gospel. 'he has filled the hungry with good things, the rich he sent empty away.' In the follow-up to the parable of the astute steward, Jesus warns that money I tainted with temptation and easily enslaves the owner. But, on the other hand, it affords one the opportunity to help the poor who, in turn, will form heaven's welcoming committee.

The psalm exhorts us to praise the Lord, who raises the poor. God is pictured high above all nations, above the heavens his glory. Yet so great is the compassion of God for the poor that he stoops from the heights to look down, to look down upon heaven and earth. The psalmist would have been surprised at the extent of this coming down of God in poverty of the incarnation, what Paul called the self-emptying of Christ.

From the dust he lifts up the lowly, from the dung heap he raises the poor.

A conscientious decision to work for justice at the side of the poor is more than an optional extra for a Christian. Without that commitment, prayer runs the risk of being an escape from harsh reality.

Praise the Lord, who raises the poor.
