REFLECTION Remembering

Jesus said to his apostles: 'Do this in memory of me.'

We all love to be remembered. This was true even for Jesus.

But if we want to be remembered, we have a duty also to remember.

Memory is a powerful thing. Wrongly used it brings death;

rightly used it brings life, and is a form of immortality.

It keeps the past alive. Those we remember never die;

they continue to walk and talk with us.

Lord when we are celebrating the Eucharist we are remembering you.

May that remembering bring us life here and hereafter.

First Reading: Genesis 14: 18-20

The first reading recounts how a pagan priest-king named Melchizedek, King of Salem (probably a shortened form for the name Jerusalem), comes to greet Abraham with an offering of bread and wine and pronounces a blessing over him. The rite celebrated here is some form of thanksgiving offering, probably for Abraham's victory over his foes. In Christian tradition the offering of bread and wine was taken to prefigure the bread and wine of the Eucharist.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 11: 23-26

St Paul's account of the institution of the Eucharist is the earliest written account. The language used is technical and clearly formulated. Moreover, the manner of expression indicates the ecclesial authority of the teaching. The recital of the words of Jesus establishes that the account comes specifically from the Jesus tradition. One point in all this is very clear; the followers of Jesus were charged to repeat what Jesus had done at the Last Supper. This re–enactment is the 'tip–off' that these people are authentic disciples.

Gospel Reading: Luke 9: 11-17

Wherever Jesus was present there was always an abundance of food, wine, fish, healing, compassion and forgiveness just to name some instances. In this passage from Luke, the munificence is again encountered. Jesus takes the loaves and fish and shows that the little they have is enough to answer the hunger of the crowd. In telling the story Luke uses the language associated with the Eucharist as he tells of Jesus 'blessing', 'breaking' and handing to his disciples. The miracle of the multiplication foreshadows the action of Jesus at the Last Supper where he instituted the Eucharistic celebration in which we participate in his self–giving, sacrificial love and endeavour to live the meaning of that celebration in our day to day living.
