TASTE AND SEE A REFLECTION OF PSALM 33:2-7

Taste and see that the Lord is good.

This line is an appropriate response to the first readings account of the first meal of the Israelites on the produce of the land of their destiny.

Meals are very significant in Luke's gospel. Nowadays we can hardly appreciate the deep significance of table-fellowship in biblical times. When a person had to grow most of their own food, to share table with somebody was an expression of sharing life. Hence the absolute shock of seeing Jesus eating with people regarded as sinners. The parable of the Prodigal Son reaches its climax in the contrast between the father who takes the wayward son back to the table and the elder son who refuses to do so.

The psalm of the day might be heard on the lips of the forgiven prodigal. The banquet for his return was rendered all the more tasteful by the father's goodness. This father figure gives a human face to the mercy of God. Picture the relief and joy on the son's face, reflecting the radiance of the father at the head of the table. Look towards him and be radiant;

Let your faces not be abashed.

The prodigal son recalls the doubts and anxieties he had experienced before he was embraced in the father's forgiveness. He makes his own the lines of the psalm:

This poor man called; the Lord heard him And rescued him from all his distress.

The radiant face of the father invites us to an honest confession this lent.

Taste and see that the Lord is good.

The Apostleship of the Sea in Great Britain is part of an international network known to the maritime world as Stella Maris, working in more than 250 ports around the world. 90% of world trade is transported by ship. However, the life of a modern seafarer can be dangerous and lonely. They may spend up to a year at a time away from home, separated from their family and loved ones and often working in harsh conditions. So, The Apostleship of the Sea provides important support to these seafarers, and relies wholly on voluntary contributions. REFLECTION - SUNDAY 31st MARCH 2019

God does not judge as we judge. No matter how far we have strayed from what we understand to be the right path, God is always waiting to receive us back. Jesus put human face on that forgiving love, as Pope Francs reminds us "With a tenderness which never disappoints, but is always capable of restoring our joy, he makes it possible for us to lift up our heads and start anew." (The Joy of the Gospel, 3). There is a challenge in this also, for elsewhere Jesus asks us to be compassionate and merciful as our heavenly father is.

REFLECTION - SATURDAY 6TH APRIL 2019

The invitation of Jesus to the thirsty to come and drink from the living water that he will give leads to the discussion among the people which begins the text for today. While those who come on hearing this invitation regard Jesus as "the" prophet, others explicitly call him the Messiah. Still others question whether Jesus could really be the Messiah because of the popular belief that the Messiah would come from Bethlehem. Jesus will always remain bigger than anything that we can ever imagine. Our most intimate encounters with him must make us realise this. He cannot be captured by the concepts, words or images that we use, and wile these help us to get to know him as intimately as we want to. He reveals himself to each of us according to the level of the openness we possess.

LENT AND EASTER 2019 AT ST AGATHA'S

4th Sunday of Lent

Gospel Reading Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Jesus teaches about forgiveness in the parable of the Prodigal Son.

Reflection

The parable Jesus tells in today's Gospel is unique to the Gospel of Luke. Jesus has been teaching the crowds as he journeys to Jerusalem. As he teaches, the Pharisees and scribes complain and challenge Jesus because he is welcoming sinners at his table. Today we hear the third of three parables that Jesus tells in response to his critics. These three familiar parables—the lost sheep, the lost coin, and today's parable of the prodigal son—invite us to consider the depth of God's mercy and love.

The Pharisees taught a scrupulous observance of Jewish Law. In their interpretation and practice, observant Jews who shared table fellowship with sinners would be made unclean. Like Jesus, the Pharisees hoped to lead sinners back to God. The Pharisees, however, required that sinners first become ritually clean—observant of the Pharisees' interpretation of Jewish Law—before sharing table fellowship. This appears to be one of the major differences between the Pharisees and Jesus. Jesus reaches out to sinners while they are still sinners, inviting them to conversion through fellowship with him. Jesus is God acting among us; by befriending us, he is inviting us to return to friendship with God. Through friendship with Jesus, our sins are forgiven and we, in turn, bear fruit for God. Recall last Sunday's Gospel and the barren fig tree.

Our familiarity with today's parable risks dulling us to its tremendously powerful message. We call this the parable of the lost son or the prodigal son. Any focus on the younger son, however, must also be balanced by an examination of the unusual behaviour of the father.

First we must imagine our first response to the audacity of a son who asks for his inheritance before his father has died. Indignation would certainly be a justifiable response to such a request. Yet the father in this parable agrees to honour the son's request and divides his property among his two sons. How might we describe such a father? Foolish comes to mind, but so does trusting. Without property of his own, the father must rely upon his sons to provide for his well-being.

The younger son takes his inheritance and leaves home. The older son remains, continuing to provide for the father and the household. Having been disgraced by the younger son, the father spends some time watching the road for the return of the lost son. When he eventually sees his wayward son returning, the father not only welcomes him but also runs out to greet him and then honours him with a party. We say that this father is loving and forgiving. Yet these adjectives only begin to describe the depth of love and mercy that characterize the father.

We find no surprise in the anger of the older son. Yet the father appears sad and even confused by the older son's indignation. He says in reply that they should celebrate because the lost son had returned. The father is filled with gratitude and love for the older son's faithfulness. This love is in no way diminished by the father's rejoicing at the return of the younger son. Yet the older son's jealousy reveals his limited understanding of the depth of his father's love.

The Fourth Sunday of Lent is traditionally called Laetare Sunday. Laetare is a Latin word that means "rejoice." Today's Gospel describes the reason for our joy: God's great love for us has been revealed in Jesus. Through his Passion, Death, and Resurrection, Christ has reconciled us with God and one another.

It is an opportunity for those who would like to go to confession before the Easter Triduum, which begins on Maundy Thursday. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is one of the healing sacraments and a powerful help on our Journey of Faith.

The times and details of all Masses and services are listed in the Lent and Holy Week 2019 Programme that is available at the back of the church. Please note that, on Maundy Thursday, the Mass of the Lord's Supper is at 7.30pm, the Solemn Liturgy on Good Friday is at 3.00pm and the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday is at 7.30pm. There are no morning masses these days, though there are children's celebrations at 12pm on both Thursday and Friday.

Church Flowers during Lent

One of the ways we have decided to observe Lent is by not having flowers in the church during this season of austerity and simple reflection. We hope this absence of flowers during Lent will amplify the resurrection message of the Easter flowers when they arrive!



Friday Penance

'The Bishops [of England and Wales] wish to remind us that every Friday is set aside as a special day of penitence, as it is the day of the suffering and death of the Lord. They believe that is it important that all the faithful again be united in a common, identifiable act of Friday penance because they recognise that the virtue of penitence is best acquired as part of a common resolve and common witness. The law of the Church requires Catholics on Fridays to abstain from meat, or some other form of food, or to observe some other form of penance laid down by the Bishops' Conference (Canon1251). The Bishops decided to re-establish the practice that this penance should be fulfilled simply by abstaining from meat and by uniting this to prayer. Those who cannot or choose not to eat meat as part of their normal diet should abstain from some other food of which they regularly partake'.

The form of penance we chose to adopt each Friday is a matter of personal choice and does not have to take the same form every Friday. Failure to undertake this penance on a particular Friday would not constitute a sin.

'What can I do for Lent?'

'Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving' is the Lenten tradition. We are required to fast by reducing food intake on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, but giving up something (e.g. chocolate or alcohol) is also fasting. Extra prayer during Lent is very important.

Other suggestions also include:

*say some additional prayers each day

*visit the Blessed Sacrament

*go to weekday Mass if you can

*buy a booklet to guide your reflections.

*make the special effort involved in family prayer.

*choose one of the Gospels and read it during Lent.

*study the Sunday readings before coming to Mass

*read Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation 'GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE'

*come to the Stations of the Cross

*receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation

*Make a special effort to help someone who is poor, sick, old or lonely.

*Giving to those less fortunate than yourself.
